Dear colleagues, LIBER partners, friends and readers,

### WELCOME TO OUR LIBER ANNUAL REPORT.

Last spring, our Executive Director, Astrid Verheusen, resigned to take another position as Managing Director and CIO at the Netherlands Institute for Art History (RKD). LIBER started a full recruitment process, and a new Executive Director, Martine Pronk, was appointed and started on 1 August 2023. This editorial gives me the opportunity to stress the increasing importance of the LIBER Office and, as head of the office, of the LIBER Executive Director.

The number of LIBER staff has increased a lot in the past 10 years, to support the development of our portfolio of activities. LIBER is involved in many European projects, taking part in the main evolutions of the Libraries and Information Science and Open Science landscape in Europe and across the world. LIBER has major partnerships with important stakeholders in Europe – Science Europe, Coalition S, EOSC and LERU, just to name a few. Our relationship with the EU Commission is vivid and successful, in a context where research libraries need a strong voice in Brussels. With LIBER, they find that voice.

LIBER has developed partnerships with other important stakeholders, with global players like UNESCO, regional players like LA Referencia in South America, and of course twin library associations like ARL, CARL, CAUL, RLUK and many others. Additionally, LIBER has a full portfolio of events: webinars happen frequently, the Annual Conference is a huge success every year attracting more than 400 attendees, the Winter Event is in its third year and is highly rated by participants, and LIBER has created relevant specific programmes, like the Emerging Leaders Seminar, the LIBER Journées, the Citizen Science Masterclass, the Architecture Seminar, and so on.

None of the above would be possible without the strong commitment of the LIBER Office. I'd therefore like to take the opportunity to thank them for all that they do, on behalf of the LIBER Executive Board, our Steering Committees and Working Groups and, more broadly, on behalf of the entire LIBER community.

For many years the milestone event for LIBER has been its Annual Conference, taking place every summer. After introducing the first Winter Event in Amsterdam in 2022, we organised a second one in Fiesole, Italy, last November. The event stands as a key initiative to engage with the LIBER community, and this challenge is an important one for us. LIBER has grown over the past years into a more complex organisation. When inventing and designing the LIBER Winter Event, the ambition was to offer an opportunity for our more active members to gather and work together to strengthen our internal network. Thanks to the 2023 Winter Event, we also tackled another important issue: engaging beyond the LIBER community. The day before the event the LIBER president, vice-president and several other board members attended a collocated meeting with a number of Italian librarians from Higher Education and Research Institutions, where the future of academic libraries in Italy and in Europe was discussed. Many of the Italian librarians were invited to attend and engage with the LIBER community during the Winter Event itself.

This was a fruitful initiative that we will repeat in Maribor, Slovenia, in November 2024, connecting LIBER members with non-LIBER members and bringing national issues to the European level, and European issues to national attention.

I now invite you to discover the full portfolio of our activities. Enjoy the reading.

# EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT REFLECTIONS 2023–2024

### **Executive Board Report**

Annually, we report on the main events and achievements from the past reporting period, starting from the date of the previous LIBER Meeting of Participants (July 2023).

In 2023, some 431 organisations participated in LIBER, representing 40 countries. This shows that LIBER remains strong as the voice of research libraries in Europe!

### New Executive Director for LIBER

We were very happy to welcome Martine Pronk as the new Executive Director of LIBER in 2023. After an interim period of three months, Martine started in August as the successor of Astrid Verheusen, who served LIBER in this role for six years. Martine brings a wealth of leadership and library experience to LIBER, including participation in the LIBER network.

### Update of the LIBER Articles of Association

In 2021, the Dutch Management and Supervision of Legal Entities Act (WBTR) took effect. This law obliged LIBER to update some of their statutes' articles by notarial deed. These changes relate to the role of the board members of LIBER, and ensure and support 'good governance' by addressing situations in which conflict of interest would arise, or ensuring continuity of the governance if the board would not be able to conduct its tasks.

The Meeting of Participants voted in favour of these changes with (more than) the required two-thirds majority. The updated LIBER Articles of Associations were then confirmed by notarial deed and effective per 21 July 2023.

### LIBER Events

The past year was full of LIBER events:

- The 52<sup>nd</sup> Annual Conference 2023 was held in Budapest, Hungary. Hosted by the Hungarian Academy of Sciences with a full house of participants that rated the conference an average of 8 out of 10, it was a huge success.
- The second Winter Event took place in November at the European University Institute in Florence, Italy. Under the theme Come together! Enabling Collaboration and Inclusivity in Research Libraries, many active LIBER Participants and project partners came together to share their expertise.
- The LIBER Architecture Group (LAG) organised the LAG Seminar in April in the Royal Library Brussels, Belgium.

 The fourth edition of the LIBER Journées brought together library directors with eminent global speakers for a strategic programme at the Freie Universität Berlin, Germany, in May 2024.



Lastly, the second seminar of the LIBER Emerging Leadership Programme Cohort 6 took place in July 2023 in Budapest, before the LIBER Annual Conference 2023. It was the last part of the programme, in which Cohort 6 received their ELP certificates.

A full overview of all of LIBER's events appears later in this report.

### Finances

LIBER's financial result this year was a slight deficit of minus €40 000 on a total budget of €912 000, mainly due to higher personnel costs. Income from project activities amounted to an income of over €451 000. LIBER remains financially healthy, with almost €600 000 in reserves. During the Meeting of Participants 2023, the LIBER Treasurer presented participants with the Supporting Membership Programme, which invited participants to support LIBER with a voluntary extra financial contribution.

### **Projects**

The Office Project Staff have been working on eight projects and submitted four proposals for new projects. All the ongoing projects will be expected to be completed by the end of 2025 and efforts are under way to attract new opportunities. ### LIBER Quarterly

Volume 34 No.1 was published in February 2024. The LQ Editorial Board got together for blended (in person/online) meetings in July and November 2023. The LQ Board continues to build the journal's peer reviewer network and actively seeks interested people to join the board. Read more in the LIBER Quarterly Report within this publication.

### The LIBER Office

Nine staff members work at the LIBER Office, under the leadership of the Executive Director. Staff mobility is rather a challenge for a small organisation such as LIBER, however, enthusiastic new colleagues were found to replace departing office members.

### **Executive Board composition and meetings**

Of the 13 Executive Board members, five were re-appointed to a second or third term: Heli Kautonen, Birgit Schmidt, Andreas Brandtner, Hilde van Wijngaarden (Treasurer) and Anja Smit (Secretary General). The Meeting of Participants ratified these re-appointments.

The board met in person in July 2023 in Budapest, Hungary, in October 2023 in Sheffield, UK, and in Lausanne, Switzerland, in February 2024. The board discussed progress in realising our 2023-2027 Strategy, updates from the Working Groups, partnerships and new initiatives such as the European Universities Initiative (EUI). The board discussed how to effectively govern the growing number of LIBER events, services and activities.

# LIBER QUARTERLY

The Journal of the Association of European Research Libraries

LIBER Quarterly (LQ) is the peer reviewed, Open Access journal of LIBER. In 2023, using the continuous publication model, LQ published 14 papers, culminating in Volume 33 of the journal. This report considers performance and impact of LQ and discusses current and future developments of the journal and its related activities.

### LQ online activity and impact

In this report, we present the second full year of user statistics since LQ moved to the openjournals.nl platform. The views and downloads of LQ papers are presented in the table below.

The most downloaded paper published in 2023 – with 966 downloads – was Ma, L. (2023). The Platformisation of Scholarly Information and How to Fight It. LIBER Quarterly: The Journal of the Association of European Research Libraries, 33(1), 1–20.



Between January and December 2023, LQ's acceptance rate was 24%, up by 3% from 2022. In 2023 LQ published papers in the following content categories:

- Guest editorial (1)
- · Article (5)
- Case study (2)
- Review paper (1)
- Practice paper (5)

All papers published in LQ in 2023 received at least two anonymous peer reviews, as per the LQ policy. Sincere thanks go to all those professionals and academics who agreed to undertake peer reviews for LQ in 2023. As of January 2024, there were six papers in review and three accepted papers being made ready for publication in Issue 34.

### Developments

Over the past year, the Editorial Board appointed four new members – Caleb Derven, Najmeh Shaghaei, Leonidas Papachristopoulos and Justine Rush.

The Editorial Board is currently considering the development of 'data papers' as a new paper category. Additionally, a Working Group has now convened to examine the possibility of open peer review for the journal, with exploratory work expected to start in summer 2024. There are also ongoing discussions about best ways of formally recognising peer reviewer activity.

The LQ Managing Editor continues to work with the LIBER Office to promote coordinated communications activity between LQ and LIBER.

In 2024, it is proposed that the Editorial Board consider whether to draft an LQ development plan for consideration by the LIBER Executive Board. In recent years, the LQ Editorial Board has achieved a great deal, including a refresh of content policies, journal content development, extended reviewer networks and



transfer to a sustainable open platform. During this time, there have also been significant contextual shifts; the journal may benefit from a defined period of larger-scale thinking based on industry developments, scenario forecasting and community insights, so that LQ can develop in line with emerging ideas about open scholarship and in accordance with the LIBER Executive Board's strategic goals.

### **Editorial Board**

The LQ Editorial Board assembled for blended (in person/online) meetings in July and November 2023. The board continues to build LQ's peer reviewer network and actively seeks interested people to join the board, particularly those with expertise and interest in Open Data, libraries as Open Science partners and the use of emerging technologies (like AI) in libraries. The board would also welcome enquiries from anyone interested in supporting editing activities, for example, copy editing. A strengthening of the LQ volunteer team will contribute to succession planning for the journal and all its activities.

### COLLABORATIONS, PARTICIPATIONS, JOINT ACTIONS

LIBER regularly collaborates with key European research and Open Science stakeholders. Take a look at the collaborative events and actions we participated in last year.

#### Manifesto for 2024 EU Elections

In collaboration with European Bureau of Library, Information and Documentation Associations (EBLIDA), the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA), Public Libraries 2030 (PL2030) and National Authorities on Public Libraries in Europe (NAPLE Forum), LIBER has formulated a manifesto to support libraries across Europe in their involvement and impact with EU policy. As libraries act as facilitators of societal priorities such as the green transition, digital upskilling and fostering democracy, they need increasing access to EU funding and support. This manifesto is the first of two phases, serving as a tool for libraries to communicate and advocate their needs to local and EU policy makers and wider community networks.

### LIBER and LA Referencia webinar

In July 2023, LIBER and OCLC announced the launch of an engagement programme based on LIBER's 2023-2027 Strategy, which presents a vision for the future of research libraries. The series of discussions will collectively examine, explore and ideate around rapidly evolving technologies, a drive for open content, and the imperative of supporting rights and values.

### Open Science Monitoring in Europe: A LIBER, UNESCO and LA Referencia webinar

In October 2023, LIBER joined forces with LA Referencia and UNESCO to host a webinar providing a state-of-the art analysis of the Open Science monitoring methods and tools currently developed in Europe. The event introduced the concept of inclusive monitoring of Open Science, in line with the 2021 UNESCO Recommendation on Open Science.

### LIBER and ADBU joint report and toolkit on Open Science **Services within research libraries**

LIBER and ADBU (Association des directeurs et personnels de direction des bibliothèques universitaires et de la documentation) have released a joint report on FAIR Research Data Management (RDM) and Open Access (OA) support services within libraries. The report - titled Open Science Services by Research Libraries: Organisational Perspectives is the result of a study examining libraries with developed RDM and OA services, to understand the stages involved in their creation and the key competencies that are required. An accompanying toolkit has also been created to encourage an acceleration of the adoption of RDM and OA services.

A prerequisite for achieving this vision is a strong and well-functioning network of repositories that provides human and machine access to the wide range of valuable research outputs.

# **NEW LIBER STRATEGY 2023-2027**

In 2023, LIBER announced its new strategy for the period 2023–2027, outlining three driving factors impacting research libraries:



A drive for Openness comes from academia, the broader society, European governments, and the European Union.



Artificial intelligence and other technological developments will accelerate the digital shift and profoundly affect research and scholarly communication.



An increasing awareness and demand by society and academia to uphold rights and values in the digital scholarly environment.

LIBER formulated a strategic response to these driving forces, consisting of five components. The final two elements are fundamental preconditions that will support and sustain our vision.

### RESEARCH LIBRARIES AS ENGAGED AND TRUSTED HUBS

By 2027, research libraries will be engaged and trusted hubs of their user communities, collaborating with each other and with local, national and international stakeholders in their role as change agents and facilitators, and taking up task in public engagement in research.

### **STATE-OF-THE-ART SERVICES**

By 2027, research libraries will provide forward-looking, state-of-the-art services for collections, publishing, and curation of information and (meta-)data. These services will be relevant to and tailored for user groups inside and outside academia.

### **ADVANCING OPEN SCIENCE**

By 2027, in collaboration with researchers, research libraries will stimulate, facilitate, co-develop and manage infrastructures and practices designed to take Open Science to the next level.

### **UPSKILLING THE LIBRARY WORKFORCE**

By 2027, the staff of research libraries have the necessary knowledge, confidence and skills to take on the organisational and technological changes enabling the new roles and tasks of research libraries. The first quarter of 2023 was spent aligning the plans of both Working Groups, and finding the common denominator or elements of synergy under the Upskilling SC.

### **UPHOLDING RIGHTS & VALUES**


By 2027, research libraries embody and uphold values of integrity, diversity and inclusion inside and outside the research community. Although there is no defined Steering Committee for this element, we view it as being under the ownership of all of LIBER. How it will be concretely reflected in the strategy will be discussed during the coming year.

# To implement the strategy, we have defined Working Groups & Steering Committees per topic.

Working Groups are the primary units to conduct work on the LIBER strategy and can be seen as the lifeblood of the LIBER community. Between 10 to 15 Working Groups are simultaneously actively working on topics relating to the LIBER strategy, while engaging around 100 to 150 LIBER members. The following Steering Committees will coordinate the strategic work of the Working Groups and our portfolio of International Projects, monitor their progress, and support the setting up of new Working Groups under the strategy plan.

### Working Groups

### Architecture Working Group (LAG)

The LIBER Architecture Working Group (LAG) is preparing for the LAG Seminar 2024, an event taking place once every two years to bring librarians, architects and an array of stakeholders in library architecture and design together to discuss and raise awareness on new projects and trends. The seminar took place from the 24–26 April 2024 at the KBR (Royal Library of Belgium) in Brussels, under the theme: 'Building Bridges: Libraries as Engaged and Trusted Hubs'. More than a theme, this year the LAG Seminar stood as a call to action for participants to join LIBER's mission to redefine the role of libraries in society.

For the first time, a call for proposals was issued to the LIBER network to present their innovative library project at the LAG Seminar. As a result, more than 20 innovative projects from all over Europe were showcased and discussed, with a focus on topics such as inclusivity, community engagement, and sustainability in library architecture.

### Citizen Science Working Group

In January 2023, the Citizen Science Working Group came together to define their work plan for the next strategic period aimed at cementing the role of libraries in the integration of Citizen Science into academia. The result was three clearly defined strategic directions:

SD1: Developing the Working Group
Developing the field of Citizen Science
in research libraries

**SD3:** Encouraging the involvement of research libraries as integral to Citizen Science.

The Working Group continues to run several activities. The LIBER Citizen Science Executive Masterclass will run from the 8–9 May 2024 to upskill library leaders in how to integrate Citizen Science at their institutions. The group's collaboration with SciStarter continued in 2023 with the final of the three-part webinar series being held in November. An important milestone was passed in March 2023: the publication of the second section of the Citizen Science for Research Libraries: A Guide. Titled: Library Infrastructures and Citizen Science. Work is ongoing to establish an editorial committee for the remaining sections of the guide, due to be completed this year.

# Copyright and Legal Matters Working Group

Following launch of new LIBER strategy, the Copyright and Legal Matters Working Group has been reviewed to ensure the priorities of the new strategy are being addressed. The Working Group has delivered excellent advocacy and lobbying on policy development particularly at EU level over the previous years. However, the new strategy requires consideration of institutional policy development and implementation, and the upskilling/sharing of best practice across practitioners at LIBER Member Organisations. The Working Group will therefore refocus in the coming period under new co-chairs, and held a positive meeting at the LIBER Winter Event 2023 to define the next steps.

### International projects



CeOS\_SE - Citizen-Enhanced Open Science in South-Eastern Europe Higher Education Knowledge Hubs LIBER coordinates CeOS\_SE which aims to mainstream

Open and Citizen Science (CS) practices in Southeastern Europe. In June 2023, the first CeOS Multiplier Event, led by UNLIB, took place in Belgrade. Later that summer, work to enable the uptake of Citizen Science in Higher Education Curricula and Open Science practice started. The University of Patras, in the lead of this activity, followed a detailed work plan and distributed a survey among HEI students. Its findings will be detailed in upcoming project deliverables. Another outcome of this work was the delivery of video interviews, which can be watched here. In November 2023, the CeOS\_SE project hosted a workshop at the LIBER Winter Event. Project partners from UNITO, UNILIB, NSK and UP shared the outcomes of their work within the project. Read the event report on the LIBER website. In March 2024, work on the final project result began. This new activity will bring the CeOS\_SE partners together for various events, including a dedicated stakeholder event in Limassol, Cyprus, during the LIBER Annual Conference.



The KR21 - Knowledge Rights 21 programme The Knowledge Rights 21 Programme aims to mobilise Europe's libraries to engage with others across the access to knowledge movement and build momentum towards long-term copyright reform. The programme has entered its final year and is preparing a manifesto which will set the priorities for policy-making in the field of openness for knowledge. In 2023, LIBER's role in the Knowledge Rights 21 project focused on Secondary Publishing Rights (SPR) – a legal instrument that allows the republication of research in an openaccess repository or elsewhere. In November we hosted a second webinar on the topic, and released the final report; Secondary Publishing Rights in Europe: Status, Challenges, and Opportunities. A summary of LIBER's work on SPR in KR21 is available on our website. To try and connect the project more closely with the LIBER network, the National Coordinator for Italy, Deborah de Angelis, was invited to the LIBER Winter Event 2023 in Florence to meet the Copyright and Legal Matters Working Group.

# LibrarIN - Value Co-Creation and Social Innovation for a New Generation of European Libraries

LibrarIN examines ways in which libraries can develop new functions, services and engagement with the individuals, organisations and communities they serve through social innovation and cocreation techniques. The 2nd General Assembly Meeting took place in Denmark on 1-2 June 2023 and was hosted by the Danish Social Innovation Academy and Roskilde University. In the Work Package on Stakeholders' Co-Design and Validation, LIBER has been responsible for the recruitment and organisation of LibrarIN's Stakeholder Panel, currently consisting of 31 experts representing European libraries and library associations as well as policymakers, academia and civil society. The first online Stakeholder Panel meeting took place in September, which was followed by a full day inperson Stakeholder Panel workshop in Amsterdam in October. Since the first deliverables of the project were submitted in late November, LIBER, leading the dissemination of these deliverables, has multiplied the contact with all partners for event participation. Four new meetings are scheduled to take place in 2024 (in person and online), as well as the formation of Panel expert Entrepreneurship and Living Labs. LIBER is also involved in pursuing case studies around these themes in the Work Package on Thematic and Empirical Work in Selected Co-Creation Areas. ### Working Groups

### FIM4L (Federated Identity Management for Libraries) Working Group

The FIM4L (Federated Identity Management for Libraries) Working Group aims to develop a library policy for federated authentication which is broadly supported by libraries and publishers. The group continued its discussion on the scope and relationships between Open Science and managed access while protecting researcher and subject privacy. The workshop at the Winter Event 2023 was used to explore further possible use cases, also in discussion with the LIBER Open Access Working Group.

In August, Jos Westerbeke, chair of FIM4L, presented at the IFLA World Library and Information Congress in Rotterdam, the Netherlands. The group wrote an informative blog post for the LIBER website detailing recent browser developments and IP-address authentication and how they will affect research library systems. Members were also involved in the organisation of a FIM4R workshop on 30 Jan 2024.

The group will soon begin work on a template for libraries to help them create flyers/infographics on privacy-preserving access to library collections.

"A modern library likely provides access to its collection in an online fashion. Their users only need a laptop or device connected to the internet and a library is able to provide its service to every home. Great opportunities in the light of sustainability: reduce travelling, no fixed PCs needed in the building, and so on.

But what about online identification to access the library collection? What about privacy? We would like to bring this to your attention.

### Data Science in Libraries Working Group

The Data Science in Libraries Working group (DSLib) held a successful workshop at the LIBER Winter Event. For the workshop a prototype of the Digital Scholarship & Data Science Essentials for Library Professionals Learning Hub was created. In March 2024, group members met in person, together with the LIBER Digital Scholarship and Digital Cultural Heritage Group, for a two-day edit-a-thon to further the work on the protype. Currently it covers a basic introduction and exercises on LLMs and LOD, and points to existing competence frameworks and learning materials.

Next steps for the group's landscape study on Data Science practices are underway, following the call for survey respondents in 2022. The group agreed on a methodology for the literature review and is currently collecting reviews of papers and adding references to their shared Zotero library. Writing of the study started in March 2024.

The group is continuing to collaborate with the Research Data Management Working Group and Digital Scholarship and Digital Cultural Heritage Collections Working Group, and will hold a workshop with both groups at the LIBER Annual Conference 2024.

### Research Data Management Working Group

The Research Data Management Working Group works to help libraries secure a critical role in the 21st century scholarly information infrastructure and to recognise research data as valuable academic resources that need to be managed, shared and preserved. The group was active both at the 2023 Annual Conference and the 2023 Winter Event, with both workshop reports available on the groups resources webpage.

In June 2023 the RDM Working Group released an interview with **Data Curator Matthias Towe**, to help others learn more about the vital role that Data Curators play within libraries. Following this was a webinar, **Research Data Curation: What Libraries Can Offer**, which discussed the concept of data curation, and underlined how research libraries can assist with data curation practices.

The group was highly instrumental in planning and facilitating the group discussion at the <u>OCLC-LIBER Webinar</u> on 15 November 2023. In 2024, they hosted a highly popular <u>webinar on Data Management Plans: Use and Reuse</u> and began discussions for their 2024 work plan.

### Working Groups

### Open Access Working Group

The Open Access Working Group provides libraries with practical guidance for implementing Open Access. To this end, group members represent LIBER in the following networks:

- cOAlition S Working Group: Moving away from APCs (Ruth Mallalieu, Oxford University Library / Colleen Campbell, Max Planck Digital Library)
- SCOSS (Olaf Siegert, ZBW)
- Think.Check.Submit (Sofie Wennström, Stockholm University Library)
- SPARC Europe (Frank Manista, JISC).

For Open Access Week 2023, we highlighted some of the actions that the group is involved in, including Think.Check. Submit and the new cOAlitionS Working Group. The Group has been approached by DOAJ to host a common workshop for the library community, with a consensus to organise such an event in 2024.

The group took part in the 2023 Annual Conference with a workshop, 'Open Licensing: How Libraries Can Provide Support for Academics' and at the Winter Event with a workshop, 'A Long and Winding Road – transforming to OA publishing is a journey'.

### Educational Resources Working Group

The Educational Resources Working Group aims to support European librarians in their role to provide educational resources to staff and students. After shifting their focus in 2023 to Open Textbooks, the group met with representatives from OAPEN/DOAB in order to see if and how OAPEN/DOAB could be a venue for collecting open textbooks.

The group held a panel presentation and discussion at the IFLA WLIC in August 2023, 'Enhancing the Discoverability of Open Textbooks: The European Initiative of the LIBER Education Resources Working Group' (see blog post), and were also active at the LIBER Annual Conference with a workshop on enhancing the discoverability of Open Access Textbooks. The group recently conducted a survey on best practices concerning OER/Open Textbooks, the results of which will be released on LIBER channels soon.

### International projects

### Open Research Europe

### **ORE - Open Research Europe**

Open Research Europe (ORE) is an Open Access, peer-reviewed publishing platform for European Commission-funded researchers (Horizon 2020, Horizon Europe, and Euratom) across all disciplines, with no author fees. LIBER is a partner in the project and spearheads efforts to engage research libraries and other stakeholders who could benefit from the platform. In 2023, LIBER's work has focused on the ORE Librarians Advisory Group - a group of dedicated librarians and Open Research experts from LIBER member organisations who champion Open Research and actively participate in shaping the future of the ORE platform, its sustainability and success. Currently comprising 24 librarians representing 20 European countries, the group remains open to additional applications.

After the kick-off of the Advisory Group in June 2023, a second meeting followed online in October, a third in hybrid form at LIBER's Winter Event in November, and a fourth in March of 2024. The group's fifth meeting is scheduled for to take place at the LIBER Annual Conference in Limassol, Cyprus.

Two blogs written by or in collaboration with LIBER were published on the ORE website: an interview with previous LIBER President, Kristiina Hormia-Poutanen and a report on ORE at the LIBER Annual Conference, Libraries and Open Access Publishers: Fostering the Connection. ### DIAMAS – Developing Institutional Open Access Publishing Models to Advance Scholarly Communication

DIAMAS is developing a European Reference Standard in the domain of institutional publishing, with particular attention to Diamond OA publishing initiatives. It aims to improve the efficiency, quality and good practices of publishing activities and services in the European Research Area (ERA) at all institutional levels. After conducting a survey to understand better institutional

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publishing in the European Research Area, the DIAMAS project packaged the results and findings from the survey into a report: *Institutional Publishing in the ERA: Results from the DIAMAS survey.* LIBER played an active role in delivering the report, including writing a synopsis version. To introduce the insights of the survey, LIBER moderated and hosted the kick-off webinar on 7 February 2024, which 250 people attended. Read more about the survey and the resulting report on the DIAMAS Website.

As part of LIBER's role leading this Work Package, our work will now focus on communicating and disseminating project deliverables, and working to facilitate the creation of the **DIAMAS Common Access Point.** 

# MES-CoBraD - The Multidisciplinary Expert System for the Assessment & Management of Complex Brain Disorders

The MES-CoBraD project seeks to improve early, accurate and comprehensive diagnosis of CoBraD through the multisource-multidisciplinary MES-CoBraD Assessment Protocol. The project aims to engage citizen scientists throughout the project cycle - an objective that LIBER's network will help facilitate. Alongside leading project activities related to stakeholder engagement and opportunity-based dissemination, LIBER also supports and participates in the development of legal and ethical frameworks, landscape analysis and methodology, RWD acquisition pilots, and awarenessraising communication. LIBER presented a poster on Data Management in the MES-CoBraD Project at the LIBER Annual Conference 2022. In 2023, LIBER organised two project webinars: the first aimed at introducing the MES-CoBraD work to key project stakeholders; the second in collaboration with partner HORIZON projects - RE-SAMPLE and RETENTION - sought to demonstrate MES-CoBraD's approach to recruiting and collecting data. Several deliverables from the project are also available on **Zenodo**.

### PALOMERA Project - Policy Alignment of Open Access Monographs in the European Research Area

PALOMERA, which has entered its final year in 2024, focuses on ensuring that academic books and monographs are not neglected in Open Science and Open Access policies. LIBER has assisted PALOMERA with its landscape analysis, specifically mapping the European landscape for the Open Access Monographs policy. This involved gathering data on national library book publications and conducting a focus group interview with librarians, which LIBER organised and executed. On 20 June 2023, LIBER and PALOMERA partnered with Craft-OA and the DIAMAS project to host a webinar on **Creating Community-Driven Pathways** to Equitable Open Scholarly Publishing. The follow-up webinar to evaluate the progress of each project took place on 29 February 2024, led by OPERAS: Creating Community-Driven Pathways to Equitable Open Scholarly Publishing: Where are we now? A third event will be organised for the autumn of 2024. LIBER will continue to assist PALOMERA in disseminating project results to our network as key deliverables are released towards the end of the project.

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# UPSKILLING THE LIBRARY WORKFORCE

### Working Groups

### Leadership Programmes Working Group

With a new co-shared leadership, the LIBER Leadership Working Group has reviewed its organisation, procedures, and participation in subtasks. The Emerging Leaders Programme (EPL) completed its sixth cohort in 2023. The second and final seminar for Cohort 6 took place in Budapest before the LIBER Conference in July 2023. After ten successful years, the Leadership Programmes Working Group conducted an evaluation of the Emerging Leaders Programme, which will lay the foundation for the Programme in the coming years. Planning for the new period has begun, and a call for ELP 7 will be announced during summer 2024, with a start date for the programme of summer 2025. The fourth edition of LIBER's Journées Leadership Programme, exclusively for library directors, will take place from 29–31 May 2024, at the Freie Universität in Berlin.

### Digital Scholarship and Digital Cultural Heritage Collections Working Group

The Digital Scholarship and Digital Cultural Heritage Collections Working Group (DSDCH WG) is a knowledge and skills-sharing network for colleagues within European libraries with an interest in digital humanities, digital scholarship, and digital cultural heritage collections. In 2023-2024, the group strived to build on the **previous years' work** which had identified the skills needs of LIBER members' staff (Europe's Digital Humanities Landscape: A Study From LIBER's Digital Humanities & Digital Cultural Heritage Working Group), and began to surface and collate resources to provide an easy entry into topics relating to digital research. DSDCH WG's collaboration with the Data Science in Libraries Group continues to run smoothly and productively with a second joint workshop conducted at the LIBER Winter Event 2023. The workshop continued to develop the elements of the prototype learning hub, 'Digital Scholarship & Data Science Essentials for Library Professionals'. In March, the two groups came together for an edit-a-thon to consolidate feedback from the workshop and build towards a template for individual learning guides on digital topics.

The Upholding Rights and Values part of the LIBER strategy weaves throughout all LIBER activities – within our Working Groups, the events we organise and our work on international projects. The current strategy identifies upkeeping rights and values as one of three driving factors impacting research libraries and LIBER as an organisation.

"By 2027, research libraries will embody and uphold public and academic values of integrity, diversity, and inclusion inside and outside the research community."

In 2024, the LIBER Executive Board continued to develop plans to create guiding principles, policies and recommendations that uphold and embed values, and therefore materialise the goals of the LIBER Strategy 2023-2027.

### Working Groups

# Identifying Rights and Values for Research Libraries

The following values have been identified as crucial:

- Academic sovereignty
- Copyright
- DEI (Diversity, Equality, and Inclusivity)
- European solidarity
- · Integrity and transparency
- Privacy and user rights
- Sustainability

The United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights must always be kept in mind: upholding basic values of peace, freedom, social progress, equal rights, and human dignity. Also, of utmost interest and relevance are the UN Sustainable Development Goals and the constitutional values of the European Union – human dignity, pluralistic democracy, freedom, tolerance, equality and non-discrimination.

Finally, we recognise the values selected by the LIBER community: intellectual freedom, access to scholarship, responsible stewardship, leadership and innovation, inclusivity and equality.

# Proposition for Upholding Rights and Values within LIBER

Rights and values are now a standing item on the agenda of the Executive Board. There are concrete plans for workshops and other activities to bring rights and values to the forefront of LIBER activities.

Rights and values will be championed by:

- Identifying threats to rights and values through workshops with the LIBER Community
- Proposing activities that will lead to more interactivity within LIBER regarding rights and values, such as: encourage rights and values discussions at LIBER events, encouraging paper submissions on rights and values to the Annual Conference and LIBER Quarterly, and including research libraries in discussions on academic freedom
- Formalising rights and values into LIBER-supported educational programmes and activities such as the LIBER Journées and Emerging Leaders Programme
- Emphasising the concept of 'the right of access to information' in LIBER communications and resources
- Bringing Open Science firmly within a rights and values context in LIBER communications and resources.
- During the Executive Board meeting in February 2024, board members worked to make this strategic direction more library-specific. The connection was made to Open Science and copyright, and how we as libraries can safeguard rights in these domains. Looking at the CARE principles (moving beyond FAIR) was also a key theme in the discussions.

Work to embed rights and values within LIBER activities is already underway:

- 'Embedding equity and diversity in daily operations' was a submission theme for the <u>Call</u> for <u>Proposals</u> at this year's Annual Conference.
- The Strategic Vision of the LIBER Journées explores various aspects of rights and values under the theme of 'Trusted Leadership in Challenging Times'.

### Workshops on Rights and Values

The LIBER Executive Board plans to organise a workshop at the Winter Event 2024 to address (copy)right, values and Open Science, to define actions that LIBER can promote in this area. Reporting from workshops should provide important insight into the rights and values landscape across Europe and build grounds for next steps within the LIBER strategic framework.



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# **LIBER ANNUAL ACCOUNTS 2023**

### Accounts

LIBER's financial position maintains a solid balance, although the financial result for the Foundation for the year ending 31 December 2023 is a loss of € 39 760 (2022: a surplus of € 147 898). LIBER's capital and liquidity position is currently in order.

By 2023, income was slightly lower while expenditures increased. Projects provided a significant contribution of income: the LIBER organisation depended approximately 50% on temporary project income. This is much more balanced than the 60% project income in 2022, which was foreseen as the result of one-off growth in the number of projects and a catch-up in billable work for already ongoing projects following the end of the COVID-19 crisis.

To ensure future sustainability, ongoing attention needs to be given to further strengthen the foundation. During the Meeting of Participants in July 2023, a sustainability initiative – 'Supportive Membership Fee Programme' – was announced, which came into effect on 1 Januari 2024. Indexing the membership fees in line with economic developments was also announced for 2024.

The positive result of 2022 that was partly allocated to appropriated reserves (€ 75 000) will be used in 2024 instead of 2023

Solvency (equity as a percentage of the balance sheet in total) in 2023 is 66% compared to 55% in 2022. The difference with 2022 is mainly due to fluctuations in periodic payments from projects.
