Norbert Lossau's portfolio on the University Board includes the State and University Library (SUB Göttingen) and the Computing Centre of the University and Max Planck Society, GWDG. He has been responsible to fund the Göttingen eResearch Alliance and the Campus Institute Data Science and has been the co-initiator of the Digital Humanities activities at the University. Currently he coordinates among other the activities of the new University Museum ("Forum Wissen") and the climate plan 2030 of the University.

Norbert Lossau graduated in Finno-Ugrian Studies and Scandinavian Studies at the Universities of Bonn and Göttingen. In 1991, he received his PhD from Göttingen University. In 1996, he completed successfully his academic librarian traineeship. At the Göttingen State and University Library, in 1997, he set up the Göttingen Digitisation Centre, one of two DFG-funded nationwide centres for competence in the digitisation of library holdings.

In 2001, Norbert moved to the UK to become the first Head of the Oxford Digital Library at the University of Oxford. In 2002, he was appointed director of the Bielefeld University Library; in 2006, director of Göttingen State and University Library. In 2011, he was awarded an Honorary Professorship to the Berlin School of Library and Information Science from the Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin.

Norbert has been a member of a number of national and European committees, including the Working Group "Framework and conditions for data intensive Science", German Council of Science and Humanities, the Expert Group "Science 2.0 / Open Science" of the European University Association (EUA) and the Open Science Policy Platform of the European Commission, the Committees on Digitisation of the Regional Rectors' Conference in Lower Saxony and the German Rectors' Conference (HRK).



Speakers

Fecher, Benedikt

Institution: The Alexander von Humboldt Institute for Internet and Society (HIIG).

Position: Head of Research Programme: Knowledge & Society

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Since 2017, Benedikt Fecher has headed the programme area "Knowledge & Society" at the Alexander von Humboldt Institute for Internet and Society (HIIG) in Berlin. He is an interdisciplinary science studies scholar and investigates the interrelationships between science and society in the context of digitization. His research focus is on data-driven research, research infrastructures, open science and open access, science communication, and the measurement and assessment of societal impact.

In 2017, Benedikt Fecher was scientific officer for open access and research data at the Leibniz Association. He was associated with HIIG for five years as a research associate in the lead project "Opening Science". In 2016, he was also a DARIAH-DE Fellow at the Max Planck Institute for the History of Science. He is a Research Fellow at the German Institute for Economic Research.

In 2017, Benedikt Fecher received his doctorate from the Berlin University of the Arts. Previously, he studied communication science and economics at the University of Erfurt and the University of Ottawa, as well as Culture, Communication and Globalization at the University of Aalborg.



Hauber, Mark E.



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Prof. Hauber is a tenured member of the University of Illinois faculty in the Dept. of Evolution, Ecology, and Behavior at the School of Integrative Biology. He was educated at Yale (BS), Cornell (PhD), and UC Berkeley (Miller Fellow), and is an elected fellow of the American Ornithological Society, the Animal Behavior Society, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. By training, he is a behavioral ecologist and an ornithologist, who has published over 350 peer-reviewed articles and three books. As already a frequent peer-reviewer in his field, Dr. Hauber first became involved with the scientific press in 2005, serving for 5 years as an independent editor for a subscription-only behavioral journal. As editor-in-chief for 5 years he also oversaw the transition of another, ornithological journal, from a commercial press to a self-publishing model, that included nearly 50% author-free open access articles upon publication, and 100% open access within 6 months. Finally, he has recently become co-editor-in-chief of the Journal of Field Ornithology. which has just transitioned from a library- and member-subscription model to a fully open access journal in spring 2022.

Prior to moving to Illinois, Dr. Hauber held faculty positions at the University of Auckland and the City University of New York (CUNY), where he was also interim vice provost at Hunter College - CUNY and associate vice-chancellor for research at the central CUNY office. He had also served as editor-in-chief for the Auk: Ornithological Advances, editor for Behavioral Ecology and for Ethology, and associate editor for Marine Biology and for Behavioral Ecology and Sociobiology.



Jolly, Liz

Liz Jolly has been Chief Librarian at the British Library since September 2018. She is responsible for teams delivering core activities such as collection development; services for researchers, learners, businesses and entrepreneurs; research strategy and digital scholarship; an extensive cultural programme of exhibitions, events, and the Library's online presence.

Liz has over thirty years' experience in a variety of institutions in the UK university sector, most recently as Director of Student and Library Services at Teesside University. An Honorary Professor at Teesside, Liz is a Principal Fellow of the Higher Education Academy and a Fellow both of the Royal Society for the encouragement of Arts, Manufactures and Commerce (RSA) and of the Chartered Institute of Library and Information Professionals (CILIP). She was Chair of SCONUL, the UK university library directors' group, from 2014–16 and is currently a member of the Board of Governors at the University of Portsmouth. Liz is a Trustee of CILIP and of SCONUL, Vice-Chair of the SCONUL Content Strategy Group and a member of the Editorial Board of the "New Review of Academic Librarianship".

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Mendez, Eva

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Eva Méndez has been a lecturer at Universidad Carlos III de Madrid (UC3M) since 1997. She has been an active member of several international research teams, advisory boards and communities including: DCMI, OpenAire, Metadata2020, RDA, etc. In 2005–06 she was awarded a Fulbright Research Scholarship at the Metadata Research Center at University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (USA). She has taken part in and led several research projects (currently FAIRsFAIR, FAIR4Health and YUFERING) and she acted as advisor to many more in fields related with standardization, metadata, semantic web, open data, digital repositories and libraries, in addition to information policies for development in several countries.

In 2015 Eva won the Young Researcher of Excellence award at her University. In November 2017 she was named "Open Data Champion" by SPARC Europe. She was the chair of the EU-OSPP (European Open Science Policy Platform) on behalf of YERUN (Young European Research Universities Network) for the second mandate of the platform and RDA (Research Data Alliance) ambassador for Interdisciplinary research. She is currently Deputy Vice President for Scientific Policy Open Science at UC3M.



Missingham, Roxanne

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Roxanne Missingham is University Librarian and Chief Scholarly Information Officer, Australian National University (ANU). Her portfolio includes ANU libraries, ANU archives, ANU Press and records management. She is the university's copyright and privacy officer. She leads the open access agenda and policy at ANU. Chair of the Universities Australia Working Group on Copyright and Copyright lead for the Committee of Australian University Librarians, she is a strong advocate for authors rights and legislative reform.

She was previously Parliamentary Librarian and Assistant Director General, Resource Sharing Division, National Library of Australia. She has a long career in libraries and IT focused on the development of digital delivery and digital services.

She has written the Australian university library report on the UN Sustainable Development Goals and leads a project to transform library education in Myanmar.

Formerly President of the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA), the national library body, she has been active in the International Federation of Library Associations Library and Research Services for Parliaments Section including as a committee member.

She received an Order of Australia Award in 2021 for services to libraries.



Smit, Anja

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Anja Smit has been Librarian of Utrecht University and Director of the University Library since 2010. She brings more than 30 years of national and international experience in the field of sustainable access to scientific information in different roles: as a library director, IT-consultant and library consultant.

Anja was previously director of the university libraries at Maastricht University and Radboud University in Nijmegen, and Executive Consultant for academic libraries in the New England region of the US. Together with Frank Miedema, she also led the Open Science programme at Utrecht University between 2018 and 2019. Anja is internationally active in networks: as a member of the LERU INFO/OA Group, a Member of the Board of Trustees of OCLC and as Secretary-General of LIBER.

In addition to her work for Utrecht University, she is chair of the Board of a regional Public Library, a member of the Board of the Utrecht Archive on behalf of the National Government, and a member of the Board of the Dutch Library for the Blind.

As of July 2022, Anja will start as Director of DANS, Institute of the National Academy of Science and national expertise centre and repository for research data.





Szabó, István

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István Szabó has been Vice President of the National Research, Development and Innovation Office since October 2018. As a coordinator of the Hungarian funding system of scientific research, István oversees programmes to boost institutional excellence, calls for proposals to support basic research projects of individual researchers and research teams and further flagship initiatives such as the National Conference of Student Research Societies and the New National Excellence Programme, to promote widening participation of future generations. He is also responsible for science diplomacy to build active relations with science communities worldwide as well as organising national activities related to European research and innovation framework programmes (Horizon 2020, Horizon Europe).

Prior to that, he was head of the Department of Higher Education and Research Strategy at Ministry of Human Capacities, and the head of the Department of Analysis and Information at the National Research, Development and Innovation Office, where he gained in-depth knowledge in the area of research infrastructure as project leader of the project titled National Research Infrastructure Survey and Roadmap.

István graduated in economic sciences and received his PhD from Miskolc University in 2018. Since 2021, he is honorary associate professor at the MATE Hungarian University of Agriculture and Life Sciences.



Thornton, Ann

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Ann Thornton is Vice Provost and University Librarian for Columbia University in the City of New York, where she is responsible for one of the top five academic research library systems in North America with world-class physical and digital collections and expert staff in support of research, teaching, and learning. She came to Columbia in June 2015 after serving for nearly two decades at the New York Public Library, where she was most recently the Andrew W. Mellon Director, a position she held since 2012.

Early in her career, Ann served as a systems librarian at the University of Houston Libraries. Ann is chair of the Research Collections and Preservation (ReCAP) consortium and past chair of the Ivy Plus Libraries Confederation. She has served on the board of the Association of Research Libraries, the New York State Education Department's Board of Regents Advisory Council on Libraries, and the Council of Experts for the National Academic Library and Information Systems Foundation of Bulgaria.

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Prof. Dr. István Monok is the Director General of the Library and Information Centre of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences and President of the Commission of the History of European Civilization. He is co-president of the International Association of Hungarian Studies.

Previously he was appointed Director General of the National Széchényi Library in Budapest and served in this capacity between 1999 and 2009. During his directorship he promoted the international contacts and co-operations of the library and the digitization of its holdings in the Hungarian Electronic Library. He was also involved in the creation of EUROPEANA as board member of The European Library and he is member of the advisory board of several major European libraries including the Vatican Library.

Besides being a lecturer at Szeged University, Eszterházy Károly University he taught as guest professor in Paris at the École pratiques des hautes études and the École nationale des chartres (Sorbonne), as well as at the universities of Bologna, Jyväskylä, Cluj-Napoca and Erlangen.

Currently he is the head of Comenius Institute Department of Cultural Heritage Studies at Tokaj-Hegyalja University and leading two research-groups: "From treasury to library: studies on the library and patronage of Palatin Pál Eszterházy" and "Speculum: Europa humanistica".






